- Would lead to a decrease in overall public education funding which could lead to loss of services, programs, and staff.

- Prioritize funding and incentives for teacher recruitment and retention that offers
 flexibility for districts to address local staffing needs.
- Continue to focus on addressing learning loss due to absenteeism from pandemic without tying the hands of districts and educators.

SUPPORT FUNDING

- Increase capacity of the Fast-Growth Allotment to acknowledge the growing statewide
 need and reduce proration.
- Increase the Safety Allotment with maintained flexibility.
- Fund public schools based on enrollment versus average daily attendance.

LOCAL CONTROL

- Maintain ability of local governments to hold elections on the two uniform election dates
 in May and November.
- Ensure all bond and tax rate election ballot language is clear, transparent, and understandable. Revise required language that misleads voters.
- Allow district to meet the needs of their individual students through locally developed curriculum and high-quality instructional strategies.

About Tomball ISD



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
OPPOSE VOUCHERS
