I am documenting the class weighting discussions we've had in the Westwood Engineering and Architecture advisory board meetings. Many advanced placement and IB classes at the high school level are GPA-weighted. Our understanding is that the intent for weighting classes is that the more difficult classes have potential to impact a student's GPA negatively. Increasing the weight factor levels the field for students enrolled in the more difficult college prep classes.
